- 1. PURPOSE OF POLICY
- 1.1 To facilitate the integration of sustainable design principles into all new building projects and significant renovation projects across the municipality.
- 2. DETAILS OF THE POLICY
- 2.1 The City of Port Phillip aims to foster a built environment that:
 - Moves towards the elimination of the use of non-renewable resources (such as fossil fuel based energy, mains water and materials).
 - Moves towards the elimination of solid waste production.
 - Moves towards the elimination of air, soil and water pollution.
 - Creates healthy indoor environments.
 - Protects and enhances natural eco-systems and cycles.
- 2.2 The Sustainable Design Policy refers to:
 - All planning applications for new building projects and significant renovation projects, where a significant renovation is taken to be an extension or addition where the habitable floor area increases by 50m² or more.
 - Municipal, public and private development projects.
 - All building types.
- 2.3 This Policy is supported by the Sustainable Design Strategy, which outlines a framework and actions for implementing sustainable design principles in new building projects and in significant renovation projects, and references the sustainability assessment tools that support the implementation of this policy.
- 3. PERFORMANCE AND REVIEW
- 3.1 This policy will have succeeded when all new building projects and significant renovation projects within the municipality incorporate sustainable design principles as standard practice.
- 3.2 Detailed Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are outlined in the Sustainable Design Strategy.
- 4. **RESPONSIBILITY**

5. SUNSET

This Policy will sunset four years from the date of its adoption. The policy is to be reviewed in 2010.
