About this Directory

The City of Port Phillip recognises and celebrates diversity and we are committed to inclusion and equity.

Port Phillip has a proud history of inclusion and everyone is welcome here. Multiculturalism is an integral part of our City's history and success, with Station Pier the first landfall in Australia for many new arrivals. One third of Port Phillip's residents were born overseas and this cultural diversity is one of our greatest strengths.

Our City is a place for all members of our community, where people feel supported and comfortable being themselves and expressing their identities. People of all ages, abilities, ethnicities, genders, sexual orientations, languages, cultures and religious beliefs are welcome.

The City of Port Phillip New Residents Directory was created for new migrants and people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds who live, work and study in the Port Phillip area. We spoke to several current residents who arrived in Port Phillip as migrants, refugees and asylum seekers and asked them what information they wished they had known when they arrived in Port Phillip and during their first year. This directory includes what they told us.

What is local government?

The City of Port Phillip is a local government area that represents residents from Port Melbourne through to Elwood. You can find a <u>map of the area on the Victorian Electoral Commission website</u>¹.

Local government is the third level of government in Australia and delivers services and programs to the community that it represents. For more information about local government, visit Why Councils exists².

Your Mayor and Councillors

Each local government area is governed by a Council, made up of elected members (democratically elected councillors) and administrative staff (Council employees).

The City of Port Phillip is divided into three municipal wards, with three elected councillors representing each ward.

Councillors are elected for four-year terms. Meet <u>your nine elected Councillors</u>³, including the City of Port Phillip Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

Voting at council elections

Council elections are held every four years.

You don't have to be an Australian citizen to vote in the council elections.

If you aren't on the Victorian State Roll, you can still enrol to vote in the council elections if you own a rateable property in Port Phillip.

The next Council election will be in 2024.

I'm looking for a job, what do I need to do?

Getting a Tax File Number

A tax file number (TFN) is your personal reference number in the Australian tax and superannuation systems. It is free to apply for a TFN.

You don't have to have a TFN, but without one you pay more tax. You also won't be able to apply for government benefits, lodge your tax return electronically or get an Australian business number (ABN). Find out more on the <u>Australian Tax Office website</u>²⁰.

Overseas qualifications recognition

The Victorian Overseas Qualification Unit offers free and confidential assessment services to have your qualifications recognised in Australia²¹ and help secure work. This service is free for those permanently living in Victoria.

Overseas-qualified Professionals Program

The <u>Overseas-qualified Professionals Program</u>²² is also offered at Melbourne Polytechnic and it is a unique employment-focussed program which introduces overseas-qualified professionals to the Australian labour market.

Transport Workers Union Victoria / Tasmania

Anyone who works in Australia can join a union. A union is an organisation of workers or employees who have come together to achieve common goals, for example higher pay and better working conditions.

It is optional to join a union and there is a membership fee involved. Which union you should join depends on what sort of work you do and where your workplace is located. The Transport Workers Union Victoria / Tasmania represents members who work in the private transport industry, including food delivery and ride share workers.

The program assists job seekers to gain employment and training in a wide range of fields.

What are my rights as a migrant worker?

The Migrant Workers Centre

The Migrant Workers Centre empowers migrant workers in Victoria to understand their rights, enforce them in workplaces, and connect with other migrant workers.

The Migrant Workers Centre:

- Educates workers about issues regarding workplace safety and rights
- Assists workers from emerging communities to address problems they encounter at workplaces
- Collaborates with community partners to organise events and grassroots campaigns focusing on workplace rights for migrants
- Bridges language barriers that limit workers' access to information
- Promotes workplace rights on our media platforms, as well as mainstream and ethnic community media outlets.

The Migrant Workers Centre is funded by the Victorian Government Department of Family, Fairness and Housing.

Getting an Australian Business Number (ABN)

If you're starting a business, you'll need to apply for an Australian Business Number with the <u>Australian Business Register</u>²⁷.

Depending on your business structure, you may need to apply for an Australian Company Number with ASIC. If you plan to trade under a name other than your own, you must register a business name with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC).²⁸

You can also register as an employer with the Australian Taxation Office²⁹.

Understand your business rights and responsibilities under the Australian Consumer Law at Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC)³⁰.

Stepping Stones to Small Business

Stepping Stones to Small Business is a program tailored for women from refugee, migrant and asylum seeking backgrounds. It provides opportunities for women to achieve financial wellbeing through starting a small business, finding employment, training pathways, mentoring and support.

Who do I call in an emergency?

In an emergency, please call Triple Zero (000) and ask for the service that you need:

- ambulance
- police
- fire

If you require non-emergency police assistance, don't call Triple Zero but instead call the police on 131 444.

Tenants Victoria

You can call between 10 am and 2 pm Monday to Friday. Calls are answered by lawyers, advocates and intake workers with specialist knowledge of Victorian rental laws. You may experience a wait time when calling.

Tenants Victoria also has a useful section on their website about <u>common problems for renters</u>⁴¹.


