These discussions will inform Roundtable Chair Ian Gray's report, which is due to be presented at a May Council meeting. Community safety requires a collaborative approach from a range of agencies so Councillors are looking forward to seeing the report's recommendations.

The Roundtable is one of several inputs into the development of our new, wide-ranging Community Safety Plan. We are eager to hear everyone's views when community engagement starts as this is crucial to help us develop this important Plan.

It's always a pleasure getting out and about in our community so it was great to see so many children enjoying the official opening of the Hewison Reserve upgrade. In between face-painting and bubbles, they had fun experiencing the terrific new play equipment.

It was also wonderful chatting with Hamish, a Deaf music lover, who provided valuable feedback on the haptic vests at this year's St Kilda Festival. Their sophisticated technology translates sound into vibrations so Deaf or hard of hearing festival-goers can more fully share this special group experience.

Citizenship ceremonies are always joyful but there was a double celebration this week for a conferee who also took home an engagement ring. Congratulations Karina and Marcus!

I want to thank everyone who voted for a sculpture of amazing trailblazer Louisa Briggs to be installed on the St Kilda foreshore. We expect the sculpture, to be funded by the Victorian Women's Public Art Program, to be in place by the end of 2026.

### Making a difference

It's 6 am and stars are still twinkling in the clear St Kilda sky. While traffic is yet to build, our Council's City Amenity team has already completed a preliminary scout of the streets.

Officers Richard, Wayne and Michael will also patrol parks, car parks and beaches, often accompanied by the Rapid Response cleaning team, during their shift.

The trio has experience in spades which stands them in good stead as they say 'no day's the same" on patrol in Port Phillip.

Lending a hand with fallen tree branches, offering assistance to rough sleepers and keeping footpaths clear of obstructions are just some of the varied duties they may perform during the daily patrols.

Richard says there is no judgment when they interact with people. "We assist as best we can".

"I love this job. With our previous backgrounds in enforcement (not policing), we'd see people and never see them again. Now we can see them more frequently and get to know them – and they get to know us."

The early check hasn't detected a new rough sleeper. If it had, they would follow-up with a welfare check and offer to link them to a housing service provider.

Sometimes a vulnerable person they stop to help on the street may have housing and needs other assistance.

This is the scenario when they stop off at an arcade in Acland Street where an older woman is curled up in the cold after becoming intoxicated. A walker sits beside her but there is no blanket.

Richard gently tries to wake her. "It's your lucky day, you wake up and see me," he jokes. Meanwhile Michael calls an outreach organisation which quickly arrives to help her recover before taking her home.

A man on a scooter stops to see what's going on. "Thank you for helping her," he says.

On Fitzroy Street they recognise a man who loudly calls one of them a "f-ing liar". They say he is holding a grudge about his dog being taken away by the animal management team after it attacked people in alleged robberies.

Next stop is a parking lot where three rough sleepers leave so the Rapid Response team can litter pick and pressure hose the ground. Syringes are removed along with dropped rubbish. The area was spotless the day before and will be returned to that state by the time the teams move on.

Some more rough sleepers elsewhere in St Kilda are checked. One of them, Robert, is picking up litter to keep the area clean. Although he has health issues, he is keen to find housing and get back into the workforce. Articulate and witty, Robert jokes that he is a "precocious little b-stard". The conversation suddenly takes a serious turn when he says "I just need stability and a sense of purpose".

A patrol in sand dunes on the St Kilda West Beach reveals an abandoned tent. They let it down and will remove it the next day. If there are concerns about an encampment, they return with police.

It's the end of the shift and they say it has been quiet.

The closely-knit trio enjoys some good-natured banter with each other after the patrol.

Wayne recalls the media excitement when he was recently filmed helping a Sydney visitor who had bogged his car on Elwood beach. "I also removed a rock blocking a laneway. We're pretty versatile, it's good we can all use skills we have gained over the years."

"Every day is different," Michael agrees. "We enjoy using our problem solving and resolution skills."

They relish the success stories – the people they get to know who proudly tell them they have found work or housing.

"Some people stay on your mind. But at the end of the shift, I think I've done my bit and helped make a difference – like we all do," Richard says.

report, expected to be tabled at a Council Meeting on 21 May to be released for public comment.

The Roundtable is one input to the new, wide-ranging Community Safety Plan (CSP) we are developing. Formal community engagement will start in late May as we want everyone to have their say as we are eager for our community's views to inform the Plan. This will include inperson and online opportunities including surveys, workshops and pop-ups.

We understand the strong community interest in community safety and will continue to keep you updated.

#### Citizenship ceremony surprise

Port Phillip resident Karina was only expecting a certificate from a Citizenship Ceremony at St Kilda Town Hall.

After our Council agreed to help play Cupid, she also went home with a sparkling engagement ring presented on stage on bended knee by partner Marcus.



"I was already proud and emotional about becoming an Australian citizen. I was very happy, crying tears of joy," Karina said.

While the St Kilda couple had tied the knot in a registry wedding in 2020, they say their marriage never felt complete. No parents, friends or even an engagement ring were at the simple ceremony. COVID-19 restrictions and overseas employment obligations further delayed their plans to hold the wedding celebration of their dreams.

"We never felt we had married properly, I felt there was unfinished work there," Marcus said. But with the timing now right, he was determined to bring the romance – and a ring.

After Marcus spoke to our Council, the plan was hatched for Mayor Louise Crawford to ask Karina to come up on stage to receive a commemorative Port Phillip pin. Marcus followed her and then presented the ring.

The couple is now planning the wedding they always wanted, possibly in Kazakhstan where Karina and her parents are from. Friends and family will be joining them to finally officially celebrate their love.

Karina was among 138 Port Phillip residents from 44 countries who became Australian citizens at that ceremony.

#### Louisa's legacy

Trailblazer Louisa Briggs will be immortalised with a sculpture on the St Kilda foreshore.

This was one of six public artworks announced on International Women's Day under the State Government's Victorian Women's Public Art Program.

A public vote helped determine which women should be recognised through public art.

Louisa Briggs, born on the south coast of Melbourne in the 1830s, was an Aboriginal rights advocate whose life was marked by courage, resilience and a profound commitment to her community.

Tragically, as a young girl, she was kidnapped by sealers and taken to Preservation Island in Bass Strait. Despite these early hardships, Louisa became a force for change and justice, dedicating her life to improving the lives of First Nations people.

City of Port Phillip and the Boonwurrung Land and Sea Council's (BLSC) joint proposal for Louisa Briggs' story to be brought to life for the thousands of people who live near or visit the St Kilda foreshore annually reflects its timeless message of courage and commitment.

### **Community Spirit**

#### **Good vibrations**

There were even more good vibes at this year's St Kilda Festival (SKF) with Deaf and hard of hearing music lovers able to feel the beat through haptic vibration vests.

St Kilda Festival was lent several <u>haptic vests</u> as its prize for winning the Best Metro Festival Award at the Music Victoria Awards. The Festival paid for sound engineers to facilitate the



vests translating sound frequencies to skin vibrations. The wireless setup includes a harness as well as two wrist and ankle bands to provide specific vibrations to the user's body across 24 touch points.

One of the participants was regular Festival-goer Hamish. A former Port Phillip resident and Deaf music lover, Hamish has enjoyed live music in our City since the 1980s. SKF was the first time Hamish, a long-time Midnight Oil fan, was able to experience Peter Garrett's set with a haptic vest, provided by The Newmarket Collective, and Auslan interpretation.

Hamish was keen to provide feedback to SKF:

"The availability of the haptic vibration vests was an outstanding success with a nine-year-old profoundly deaf girl wearing the haptic vest for the first time and loving it. Wearing the vest added the sensory enjoyment of the watching Peter Garrett and the Alter Egos. It had a touchy feeling element to it through electronic pulses in my skin. Many people came up to me and said they enjoyed the Auslan interpreters at the Festival, with some indicating an interest in learning Auslan."

Other accessibility improvements made over the last couple of years at SKF include:

- Auslan interpretation across five stages, spanning the New Music Stage (to foster an access lens in upcoming artists) through to the Main Stage
- free accessible buggies by Travellers Aid available all day on Sunday
- an accessible viewing platform, with an improved sightline this year
- a Quiet Space at the Victorian Pride Centre all day on Big Festival Sunday.
