Port Phillip EcoCentre unveiled

In a win for our community and environment, the completion of the new Port Phillip EcoCentre was celebrated on 25 July.

Over the past 26 years, the Port Phillip EcoCentre has grown to annually deliver education, programs and services to 19,000 participants. This growth meant the original building was no longer meeting demand or fit for purpose.

This is why we teamed up with the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action to deliver an updated, functional and sustainable building. The \$6.7 million project was made possible by the Victorian Government matching our Council's contribution of \$3.35 million. The Australian Government pledged a further \$400,000 during the election campaign.

Some finishing touches are required before the building is ready for public walk-in access. The EcoCentre will start rolling out community events for everyone to enjoy from August.

2025 Community Satisfaction Survey

Each year our Council conducts a Community Satisfaction Survey to better understand our residents' perception of our service delivery and what matters most to our community.



The 2025 results are now available and reveal an improvement in overall satisfaction and strong community endorsement for key services. We recognise there is more work to be done and the results provide valuable insights into where we need to improve. This reinforces efforts we are already taking and the focus areas in our new Council Plan. We have developed an improvement plan for 2025/26.

This year, for the first time, the survey was conducted face-to-face in partnership with independent research company Metropolis Research. This approach provided deeper insights, and more meaningful feedback. Over 900 randomly selected residents were interviewed across all neighbourhoods. More than half of the metro councils use Metropolis and they also conduct a broader survey of non-client councils to enable benchmarking across the sector and with metro councils.

A caring South Melbourne community member flagged down a divisional van after hearing the six-week-old kitten's desperate cries from underneath a car hood, where she was trying to get warm.



After being dropped off at the police station, the friendly feline enjoyed a tuna treat while several officers had a spirited discussion about who should keep her if she wasn't lost.

"I won as I already have two cats and know how to look after them," Constable Guy Wilcock said. "She was purring her head off and absolutely gorgeous."

After contacting Animal Management Officer Tom, Constable Wilcock surrendered the kitten at the Town Hall so health and ownership checks could get underway.

"He really cared about the kitten and was very clear that he wanted to claim her if he could," Tom said.

More cuddles and treats followed as the kitten charmed Council officers before being taken to The Lost Dogs Home for a microchip check, socialisation and de-sexing when she was a little older.

After several weeks, the call came. The kitty didn't have an owner and was ready to be picked up.

Her introduction to the Wilcock family went seamlessly and she is living her best life. "She still sits on my shoulder, she's amazing, very sweet," Constable Wilcock said.

"That day she was found was the most unexpected shift I've ever had."

TOUCH base at Gasworks

At its heart, TOUCH delves into personal narratives, addressing themes of prejudice and isolation while seamlessly blending ballet and Bharathanatyam. By challenging conventional paradigms and celebrating cultural richness, TOUCH sparks dialogues on inclusivity and acceptance.

Brought to life by two extraordinary artists, Deepa Mani of Chandralaya School of Dance and Sheena Chundee of Rebel Stepz Arts, TOUCH is more than a performance — it's a dialogue between cultures, communities, and creative visions.

The performance begins with each dancer presenting their individual style, underscoring the separation and isolation often experienced due to cultural differences. But as the narrative unfolds, the movements blend and merge, creating a harmonious and "bilingual" dance language that symbolises the transformative power of diversity and inclusion.

The Port Phillip City Collection (PPCC) is just a click away.

Dating from 1855, the PPCC celebrates the social, cultural, political and artistic development of the City of Port Phillip and its former municipalities of Port Melbourne, South Melbourne and St Kilda.

Its 82,619 heritage items and 663 artworks tell a compelling story about the development of the City of Port Phillip since European settlement.

The PPCC recognises the people and places which provide the tangible and intangible heritage and unique character of the area.

Historic and contemporary art works, public art, monuments and memorials, government and societal objects, maps and plans, historic photographs and documents can all be accessed online.

Our Council acknowledges the significant First Peoples identity, past and present, of the area now comprising the City of Port Phillip through the collection of contemporary art.

Within Council, the PPCC is supported by local history research services, professional collection management, experienced curators, programmers and heritage advisors and is accessible through a range of programs, exhibitions and the image reproduction service.

Our Council will invest a \$2000 Victorian Government Youth Fest grant into delivering a Clothing Swap event at St Kilda Town Hall on Saturday 27 September 2025.

The event will provide a platform for young people to engage in meaningful conversations about



overconsumption, promote a circular economy and encourage the reduction of textile waste. It will also feature live performances by emerging young musicians, supporting the

growth of live music in our City.

This collaborative event brings together the Youth Events Crew, who will curate the performances, and the Youth Advisory Committee (YAC), who will lead the delivery of the Clothing Swap. Together, they'll create opportunities for young people to showcase their talents and gain valuable hands-on experience in event planning.

Through your donations, Rotary continues to promote literacy, education and community well-being - one book at a time.



Community Spirit

Little litter legend

A young Port Phillip resident's love of litter picking has been recognised by our Council.

Isabelle, 8, was presented with a certificate of appreciation by Mayor Louise Crawford this month for her determined efforts in helping keep Albert Park clean and tidy.



Isabelle's mother Daisy said her daughter, who is neurodivergent, had also become agoraphobic and didn't want to venture outside their home.

"We were thinking about what would make her comfortable to go outside and Isabelle suggested litter picking," she said.

Armed with tongs and a bin bag, Isabelle has spent months making regular trips to pick up litter in Albert Park's public spaces, not stopping until the bag is full.



"She even wants to go out if it is raining," Daisy said.

Cr Crawford, who is a keen member of the Elwood Ploggers (who pick up rubbish while exercising), swapped litter collecting tips with Isabelle before presenting her with the certificate.

"I was so impressed with Isabelle's efforts and of all her ideas on how to encourage the community to do more to keep Port Phillip clean. Meeting her and chatting was an absolute pleasure," Cr Crawford said.

Isabelle is also passionate about ducks and brought along two toy ducks to show Cr Crawford.

She is keen to create posters incorporating ducks as the next phase of her community minded campaign to inspire others to pick up litter.

"Whenever you see litter on the ground, you should always pick it up, even if it's not yours. The environment will thank you for it later," Isabelle said.

In the meantime, her well-deserved certificate is displayed in pride of place in her bedroom.
