### 14.3 Notice of Motion – Councillor Robbie Nyaguy – Voice to Parliament

I, Councillor Robbie Nyaguy, give notice that I intend to move the Motion outlined below at the Meeting of Council on 04 October 2023:

#### That Council:

- 1. Supports the Uluru Statement from the Heart, including affirming a Yes position in the October 14 Referendum recognition establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.
- 2. Supports clear and accurate provision of information necessary for this community's informed decision making with regards to the Voice to Parliament referendum.
- 3. Reaffirms its commitment to lead reconciliation truth telling, community voice and the selfdetermination of First Nations people through the development of its third Reconciliation Action Plan.

#### **Supporting Information**

- The Uluru Statement from the Heart is an expression of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander desires for substantive reform to the Australian Constitution and to sponsor truth-telling about the past.
- The Statement calls for, "a process of agreement-making and truth-telling about our history."
- The Australian Government has committed to implement the Uluru Statement from the Heart in full and has made a commitment that a referendum be held on October 14, 2023, to enshrine an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice in the Australian Constitution.
- The Referendum will propose "A Proposed Law: to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice" and ask the question. "Do you approve this proposed alteration?"
- Council has received advice from its advisory committees and networks in relation the 2023 Referendum to:
  - Support the Yes Campaign, Older Person, Youth and Multicultural advisory
    Committees, Port Phillip Citizens for Reconciliation, Friends of Suai/Covalima and Joint Advisory Network
  - Extend its support to the Constitutional referendum Multifaith Network. and to support
- The City of Port Phillip Attitudes to Reconciliation Survey conducted between April 1 and May 15, 2019, with 563 residents participating, also provides clear evidence that Port Phillip Citizens
  - want Council to be involved in reconciliation and are prepared to be personally involved themselves.
  - see Council as having a strong commitment to reconciliation and view Council as a leader in this area.

- While the 2023 Referendum is a Federal Government initiative, Councils are close to their communities, and considered well placed to advance the local value, and importance of reconciliation, self-determination, and the voice of First Nations people.
- The result on the Referendum will inform Council's grass roots work in supporting local area First Nations voice and leadership
