Jane Kearney - Public Question Time

As a self-funded retire I have changed my budget to fit my depleted 2020 income. Why can't the Council do the same across all departments, without singling out a few, or increasing the 2020 rates?

Peter Smith, Chief Executive Officer, advised that Council has fit the Draft Council Budget to fit the depleted and projected depleted 2020 income with those savings having been made across every aspect of Councils services. The output of our work will be in the Draft Budget which the community will be able to comment on and is due to be released in June.

Adrian Jackson - Public Question Time

Poker machines have only been permitted in Victoria since near the end of the Joan Kirner government when the state was nearly bankrupt (\$32 billion in debt). Pokies are a social cancer. Currently there are 10 venues who still have them in Port Phillip. Near my home Pubs from Victoria Ave to Fitzroy St don't have any. These hotels are well run, have been modernised and prosper without them. I think greed is the main reason some venues have them as well as poor management. Councillors when will you lobby the state government to

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rid picturesque Port Phillip of this evil in our pubs that cause so much financial and social harm within Victoria. TAB and lotto small businesses are OK in my view though.

Mary McGorry, Manager Diversity and Inclusion, advised that in keeping with the sentiment of Mr Jackson's question, Council does seek to prevent the harms associated with gambling as articulated in Council's Responsible Gambling Policy through which it seeks to discouraged new gaming machines:

Within 500 metres walking distance of vulnerable communities or locations with concentrations of support services and welfare agencies;

Within 500 metres walking distance of social (public and community) housing developments: with 50 or more dwellings; or where a cluster of social housing exceeds 50 dwellings.

The question provides an opportunity to reflect on this City's annual expenditure on electronic gambling in comparison to other Cities. In 2018-2019 the City of Port Phillip had 10 venues. These venues had 377 attached electronic gaming machines (which is 506 under Port Phillip's maximum permissible number of gaming machine entitlements of 883 machines. The recorded expenditure was \$24.4 million for 2018 - 2019. As a comparison, the City of Brimbank recorded gaming expenditure of almost \$143 Million dollars over the same period from 952 machines.

The Victorian Commission for Gambling and Liquor Regulation (VCGLR) is the independent statutory authority that regulates Victoria's gambling and liquor industries. All applications for electronic gaming machines in the City of Port Phillip are made through the VCGLR and, where possible Council, informed by Responsible Gambling Policy, will seek to limit the proximity of gaming machines to vulnerable communities. The last electronic gaming machine application in the City was received in 2013.

This advice has also been provided to Mr Jackson and he has been encouraged to contact the Minister for Gambling and Liquor Regulation.

Councillor Pearl –The flood lights at Lagoon Reserve in Port Melbourne have recently been switched on to provide light protection to dog walkers and park users after dark. However, this also causes a large amount of direct light pollution to the adjacent properties causing a large amount of distress to residents. Can council officers please provide the details of our plans to remediate this light pollution?

Lachlan Johnson, General Manager Infrastructure and Amenity, advised that funds are allocated to addressing the lighting issues at Lagoon Reserve and took the question on notice to provide further detail.
